#### Sail Making & Other Skills Courses

Jack and I completed the Traditional Sail Making course - 3 glorious days of canvas, hand stitching, machine sewing, grommets, rope and leather work.

For Jack, this was a brilliant introduction to these skills. He hasn't used a sewing machine since high school home economics and has only had an occasional go at rope work; a bit while volunteering on Pilgrim and he also helped me make a big batch of eye-spliced sail ties during the first lockdown! I have had to mend sails in the wild, even by torchlight!



And I've enjoyed teaching my trainees & Deckhands the basics too - the course was a reminder that there is always something new to learn and actually taking time out to practice these skills (dare I say, for fun, rather than for necessity!) is really enjoyable and rewarding.

Our fellow Sail Makers also came at it from different perspectives. There were two gentlemen who had previously completed the 40-Week course; one is involved with the Old Gaffers Association and wanted to learn more about the how's and why's of traditional Gaff Sails, and the other is in the process of building his own boat; having already made the spars and oars, sails were the next step. And there was also a lovely lady looking to start a career in Sail Making, who at the time of writing, has just been accepted as a Sail Makers Apprentice in Falmouth! (Go Bryony!)


